

Our guest presenter this month is Paul Snowbeck, Store Manager of Fin & Fire Fly Shop located in Redmond. Paul will be presenting a program on Streamer Strategies for Trout in Central Oregon.

"From the trout streams of Montana and Idaho to Paul's home waters of the Deschutes and the Metolius, to chasing silver bullets across the West Coast, Paul gets excited every time he hits the water."

Growing up in Alaska he and his family fished every weekend during the summer, now many years later fly fishing has become not just a hobby but way of life and his profession. Through his camera lens and guiding anglers on the spectacular rivers in Central Oregon, Paul loves sharing his enthusiasm and passion for fish and their environment. With thousands of days fishing on our local waterways Paul will provide a unique perspective on the fisheries and how to target fish with effective and fun techniques not often used on Central Oregon's rivers.



OUTINGS Owyhee River Outing MARCH 31-APRIL 3 TUESDAY TO FRIDAY

This years' outing is scheduled for March 31 to April 3. Winter flows have been stable at 36 CFS all winter. The Owyhee basin has more snow than Central Oregon so maybe the flows will increase before we get there.

The Owyhee River downstream from Lake Owyhee Dam is a gem. Think the Crooked River on steroids. Instead of rainbows and whitefish, think browns, big browns. A 15-incher is a small fish. The trip is timed to hopefully coincide with the skwala hatch. If we are lucky, there will be spectacular top water action as the fish smash your skwala pattern. Other than skwalas, use the same flies and rigs you use on the Crooked. Don't forget the small stuff either. Size 18–22 midges work well too. To get a better idea, watch Brian Huskey's video of the Owyhee at: http://vimeo.com/5327229.

It takes about five hours to get to the Owyhee. Travel on Hwy 20 from Bend, via Burns to Vale. Towards the end of town, turn right at the Cenex Gas Station onto Glenn Street. Glenn Street becomes Lytle Blvd. Go for about 14 miles. Turn right just behind the little store, then take the first left. Turn right on Klamath and then left on Norwood, right on Owyhee Ave and left on Owyhee Lake Road. Sound confusing? Not really; there are a lot of signs to Owhyee State Park. If you make a mistake, any of the roads will get you there. You basically need to go southwest from the store. Check it out on Google maps.

Take Owyhee Lake Road up towards the dam. There is a bridge just below the dam with a sign to the irrigation department. Cross the bridge and you're at a campground with an outhouse and trash service. There is no cell service. There is WiFi at the museum on the irrigation department property. There is no password so you can just hangout on the bench outside the museum and use the wifi. Water is available.

You have the choice of camping at the campground, camping along the river, staying at a motel in Vale or Ontario or renting one of the two bungalows that the irrigation department manages that are next to the campground. To book one of these, go to <u>www.</u> <u>owyheedamcabins.com</u> and click on the three bars in the upper left. Take a look at the cabins and then click on the cabins calendar button. If the bungalow is not booked, send an email request to owhyeedamcabins@gmail.com and request a booking.

Unlike the Crooked, there are no developed campgrounds along the river. If you choose not to stay in the campground. you can just pull over and set up camp anywhere you like. The 10 miles of fishing below the dam to Snively Hot Springs is the best fishing. Dry Fly Innovations has an excellent blog at: <u>www.</u> <u>dryflyinnovations.com/blog</u>. There are tons of archived reports on the site. Unfortunately, it is now a paid site so you will have to decide if it is worth it to you to go back to last March to see how the hatch was a year ago. Their stoneflies are killer. I am making an order now so that I will have a dozen or so ready for this trip.

All are welcome on this outing. There is no limit to how many can come, but please let me know if you plan to attend so I can get a rough head count for the campground. If you are pulling a big rig, please park just OUTSIDE of the campground proper along the river and leave the camping area for tenters and small trailers.

We have the entire campground booked. The fee can be paid directly to Lee Ann, and it is \$5 a unit per night.

CONSERVATION

Trip Report 1/17/2020

Spent the day with a public meeting at the Madras City Hall. Met with many of the local neighbors of the Trout Creek and some of the County officials.

The county was concerned about loss of income to the tax base and questioning if farm deferral is the proper tax status for the proposed project.

The local neighbors were concerned about access for fire suppression and possible loss of a valuable member of the community if the resident caretaker moves away. One of the neighboring ranchers gave a short history of the area during the field trip to the ranch.

The 5,000 acre ranch only has about 100–200 acres of irrigated agricultural land. Most of the ranch is in steep slopes with juniper and native bunchgrass. The riparian areas are fenced and in good condition. Cattle have been excluded from the riparian zone. The riparian vegetation consists of lots of willows and cottonwoods. Lots of big basin wildrye....tall bunchgrass inside the fence.

The Deschutes Land Trust initial proposal for the OWEB application would place 45 acres of senior water rights into in stream flow for Trout Creek. I feel this water may be needed to irrigate some of the dry ag land and establish native grasses and expand the riparian zone for a few years. Restoring larger riparian



zones would slow the release of spring high water and provide additional stream flow later in the season. I feel eventually this property will be managed to increase stream flow in Trout Creek thru the summer season. I was told for now the R2 ranch removes all flow from Trout Creek below the Deschutes Land Trust property during summer irritation for adjacent hay fields.

Above is a picture of aoudad sheep. There was a herd of about 50 animals located in a field in the center of the ranch. This ranch provides lots of sunny south facing slopes for winter big game range and denser bunchgrass stands on north facing slopes. The steep slopes have many game trails left by foraging big game animals and past cattle use.

Adding this ranch to the Deschutes Land Trust will probably require some changes to their organization. A permanent caretaker will probably be needed at the least. The Land Trust should probably come up with a plan to raise some cash flow from the property to cover some of these expenses. This may entail leasing some of the ag land, leasing some hunting permits (upland bird or big game), perhaps raising some cash crop on the ag land, (native grass seed or hay), thinning or maybe selling some of the invasive juniper for slabs or firewood or some other way of financing their operation.

The land trust is concentrating on riparian areas and has a handle on how many steelhead redds use the streams on the property.

I feel COF could support this organization getting a grant from OWEB for the purchase of the property and would like to have the club keep in contact with future projects for this property. I told them the large quantity of baby steelhead make any fishing on these streams not a good option. I recommend these streams be dedicated to spawning and rearing of young steelhead only. Fishing should be allowed only on lower Trout Creek and the Deschutes River.

PARTNERSHIP CORNER Volunteer Opportunity at Camp Polk Acclimation Facility

In 2020 a major change is occurring in the upper Deschutes reintroduction program, in which the program will no longer be releasing fry and now be completely reliant on smolts releases. Another major aspect of this change is to acclimate smolts prior to their release. A variety of studies have been done on acclimation so that it helps adults return to the area in which they are released. The first acclimation facility, located at Camp Polk near Sisters, OR, will be coming online in spring of 2020 and ODFW is asking for volunteers that might be interested in helping to feed the smolts that will be in the acclimation facility, as well as to maintain and operate it. ODFW has a variety of hatcheries that are run by volunteers through the STEP program and this facility would be very similar.

Both spring Chinook and summer steelhead will be acclimate at the facility for approximately 3 weeks prior to their release. Spring Chinook are planned to be transferred into the acclimation facility on March 2nd, 2020. There will be two different groups of summer steelhead that will be transferred into the acclimation facility, with the first group on March 25th, 2020, and the second group on April 10th, 2020. The smolts will be volitionally released from the acclimation facility into Whychus Creek. The smolts will be feed three days a week schedule, on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. ODFW's Round Butte Hatchery will provide a training on proper feeding technique and the Pelton Round Butte Mitigation Coordinator will provide training on how to operate and maintain the facility for those people that are interested in volunteering to help out with the facility.

OTHER NEWS

Leaky Waders

Have you ever had a leak in your waders? Let me rephrase, have you ever had a leak in your waders that you can't find? This happened to me twice this year

SIMMS – If you are a Simms wader owner you know to turn the waders inside out and use a spray bottle with isopropyl alcohol to locate the leak. If you have never done this there is an instructional video on the Simms website. The isopropyl causes any holes to turn black so you can apply a dab of Aquaseal or UV wader repair.

Six times this summer I came home from the Metolius with a wet lower right leg and six times I tried to locate the leak. Peter Bowers at The Patient Angler advised me of a couple other tricks but to no avail so I sent the waders to Simms for repair.

To repair a pair of Simms waders you must first visit their website for a return authorization and print their mailing label. The repair link is easy to find at the bottom of the website. My waders were out of warranty. Wader evaluation, repair (if possible), and return shipping would cost me \$60.00.

About one month after shipping to Simms I received an email that the waders could be fixed. Another month passed and my waders returned with two brand new feet. No wonder I couldn't find the hole. The alcohol trick doesn't work on neoprene. Several days of fishing have passed and these waders are keeping me nice and dry.

ORVIS - While my Simms waders were off for repair I wore a backup pair of Orvis I had purchased way back when at the Orvis Old Mill store. Twenty seven days of abuse in a float tube on Silver Creek and I found my Orvis waders also had developed several leaks. The alcohol trick does not work on Orvis waders so I tried a few of Peter's tricks but no luck.

I couldn't find wader repair on the Orvis website so I visited Confluence and talked to Tye Krueger. Tye said for \$40 Orvis would repair my waders (if they were repairable) and offered to ship them to Orvis. Several weeks later my Orvis waders returned repaired. While initially I couldn't locate the Orvis wader repair on their website I did find if I searched correctly I would get the right web address.

NEW SUSPENDERS AT GEAR FIX – Looking at my now repaired Orvis waders I wished for new suspenders. (Good luck finding new suspenders for waders.) I've used Gear Fix in the Old Box Factory for tent and zipper repair as well as sewing my float tube back together. I sheepishly walked into Gear Fix with waders in hand and asked if they could repair my suspenders. Gear Fix said no problem; they fix ski bibs all the time and pointed out the suitable elastic material. One week later I had new wader suspenders. If you haven't found Gear Fix yet check them out. Besides repair they also sell and consign outdoor clothing and gear of all kinds.

GEAR TUNE-UP TIME – Now is a good time to look over your gear. It took a little over two months for the return of my Simms. Wader manufacturers including those not mentioned such as Patagonia, Redington, and Aquaz, all have wader repair links on their websites. s/Pete Martin

Such records provide a real measure of performance that donors do consider when awarding grants, so these numbers can have real impact. We cite these numbers in the annual club request to donors for items to be raffled at our annual COF Banquet - the very items you win with a successful bid. The COF Banquet is our largest fundraiser. Your bids on donated items raise most of that money.

These records are also used to award a prize to every member who volunteers 30 hours or more in a year. I need your help to capture all our volunteer data. We have many

dedicated volunteers and the more the merrier, so keep up the good work. Here are some results for recent years:

BLOWTORCH AND REDBIRD

BLOWTORCH AND REDBIRD (TAG FLIES)

ompetition anglers from Europe have contributed a number of innovative contributions to nymph fly design. One of the contributions is the addition of a colored tag for a tail on the fly. Usually, the tag is red, orange, pink, or chartreuse floss that serves as a hot spot. In the U.S. fishing scene the most common flies are contributions from two USA Fly Fishing Team members: Devin Olson's Blowtorch and Lance Eagan's Redbird. Both are very effective attractor patterns for trout and mountain whitefish. I have had great success on the Crooked River with a variant of the Blowtorch. The original pattern calls for a collar of CDC hackle. I omit the hackle collar with no loss of effectiveness. The omission also makes the Blowtorch and Redbird easy and quick ties. I use both weighted (tungsten Euro nymphs on jig hooks) and unweighted (tight line, drop shot rigs) versions in sizes 16 and 18. I also add tags to some of my other patterns such as the thread body pheasant tail and perdigons to increase their effectiveness. For directions on how to tie the patterns, Goggle them by name (just omit the CDC collar and

the counter wrap of monofilament). The recipe below includes the materials for both flies.

Materials:

Hook: Standard nymph hook, size 16 and 18 (also jig hooks)

Bead: gold or copper brass/tungsten beads (size 2.4 mm for 16 and 2.0 mm for 18)

Thread: 7/0 Fluoroscent orange Ultra thread (BT), 7/0 red Ultra thread (RB)

Tag/Tail: 4 strands of Glo-Brite floss (#5) (BT), 4 strands of Glo-Brite floss (red) (RB)

Rib: Sulky silver metallic thread (JoAnn Fabrics)

Body: Ice Dub Black Peacock

Collar: Fl. Orange thread (BT), Ice Dub Pink Dubbing and red thread (RB)
