





# FISHING **Spring Creeks**

# Education

#### SALMONFILES/ GOLDEN STONES on the Deschutes

Happy March Flyfishers! This month we'll be looking at Salmonflies/Golden Stones on the Deschutes. They don't become really important until May, but I wanted to give you plenty of time to prepare for what is probably the most famous and popular bug emergence in Central Oregon.

While the nymphs of these insects don't get really active until early May, they are available to trout year-round – they live in the nymphal stage from 2 – 4 years. In fact, I caught 2 whitefish, a rainbow, and a bull trout on a golden stone nymph on the Metolius in late Feb! The trout

know they're there, they like that big chunk of protein, and will take them during any month of the year. As soon as the water temps get to around 50 deg F the nymphs will start to emerge, and they will start their migration towards shore up to a month earlier. Yes, they emerge on shore, like most stoneflies, and usually at night. So, the only 2 stages of the insects of importance to us are the nymph and the adult; the adult does not molt into a spinner like mayflies do.

Salmonflies usually start a little before the Goldens, but they overlap considerably.

As soon as they emerge they can reproduce, but they usually take a few days to find Mr/Ms Right. After mating, the females drop their fertilized eggs in the water, and then they may fall into the water and be available to the trout. This happens most often in the evening, and the fishing can be explosive during that time. They are also available to fish during the day, when wind or birds may knock them into the water; they are not very good fliers. I've caught trout on Salmonfly and Golden Stone dry flies at all hours of the day, so don't think it's only an evening game.

This video gives a good example of some different stoneflies, including Salmonflies and Goldens. <u>WATCH VIDEO</u>

Really, if you do a YouTube search for Salmonflies on the Deschutes you'll find a bunch of videos on the subject. Most of them are just the typical "look how great a fisherman I am" videos, but some actually do give you some info. Even the cheesy ones can show you where to cast and what flies to use, so it pays to check out several.

BASIC SKILLS Fly Tying Class




# CALLING FOR VOLUNTEERS Crooked River Cleanup and Lunch

NO-SEE-UM

I saw this fly on the Fly Fish Food website and apparently it is very popular in Utah. I've modified it as I like to have the body below the surface and the thorax floating in the film.

By penetrating the film it imitates a mayfly struggling to hatch or perhaps a cripple. It may look like an easy meal to the fish or possibly be visible from a greater distance due to the abdomen below the film. Tied as below, the fly is very durable and floats very well. Put floatant on the wing and thorax.

#### **MATERIALS**

HOOK: Daiichi 1160 sizes 18-20

THREAD: Uni 8\0 Olive Dun

TAIL: Shuck, Olive sparkle Yarn

BODY: Olive Dun thread

THORAX: Superfine dubbing, BWO

HACKLE: Medium Gray Dun or Grizzly, Two sizes larger than the hook size

#### **DIRECTIONS**

- 1. Start the thread behind the eye and wrap to a point where the curve of the shank starts.
- 2. Tie in a piece of the olive emerger yarn and wrap down the shank to the bend of the hook. Wrap the thread back to the shuck tie in point. Tie in the hackle.
- 3. Dub the thorax and make 6 wraps of hackle toward the eye of the hook. Tie off the hackle and stroke all of it up to form the wing. Wetting your fingers might be helpful.
- Add some dubbing to the thread and make a wrap behind the hackle and one in front to contain it in the shape of a wing.
- 5. Tie off the thread and trim errant fibers.

# COF VOLUNTEERISM in 2024

We're coming BACK! Our programs are steadily recovering from the COVID years. Last year, we reactivated a lot of programs and events; more than twice as many volunteered than in 2022, we nearly doubled reported hours and more than doubled miles we traveled to support the events. Thank you everyone! This year, we'll need even more volunteers to reach pre-Covid levels of 4,000 recorded hours, so please join in. We have lots of fun.

In 2023, 91 COF members volunteered a total of 2,629 hours – a huge increase over 2022, when 40 volunteers recorded 1,374 hours.

Pre-COVID, our 5-year average number of volunteers was 137, quite a few more than last year's 91. That's a significant difference but we've done it before so it is doable. If you volunteered last year, THANK YOU! It takes a village to successfully run a club with the range and quality of events COF provides year after year. Please consider volunteering.

Volunteer records can be very important when we apply for grants to maintain and improve programs like Kokanee Karnival. These records provide a solid measure of performance that donors do consider when awarding grants. These numbers have real impact, so we cite them every year in our annual club requests to donors for items to raffle at our annual COF Banquet (the very items you can win with a successful bid). This is our largest fundraiser, so please join us at the Banquet on March 23rd.

These records are also used to award special recognition to every member who volunteers 30 hours or more in one year. We hope to staff many events in 2024 and we need your help to record volunteer data. Here are some results for recent years:

# HIGHLIGHTS OF THE **Board of Directors Meeting**

Treasurer: Tim Schindele presented the monthly report and it was approved by acclimation. He reported that the club paid a final bill of \$217 for 500 copies of the club's new brochure. The brochure will be available at fly shops and at activities where the club is involved within the general public. The club remains with its budget and is financially stable

New Business: Past president, Dick Olsen, presented the board with a report of volunteer hours and mileage statistics for the past year. Dick, who has been volunteering to do this task since 2012, reminded the board of the process for gathering the data and explained how it is compiled for the year end report. Such information is needed as a condition of the club's tax-free status.

John Howard, chairman of the awards committee, reported that nominations had been received from the general members and from committee members. They reviewed all nominations and proposed the recipients for the various awards which will be given at the annual banquet on March 23.

The board voted to sell the utility trailer that it has owned for a number of years and is currently stored at Tom Shuman's house. The trailer was originally bought to haul camping equipment and gear to B.C. when the club used to do an annual outing there. It has not been used for a number of years and the board decided that it probably wouldn't



be used in the foreseeable future. Tom assured the board that parking it at his property was not an issue.
